John Mark

- John Mark is similar to Saul/Paul in that he has a Jewish and a Roman name.
- Linked with Peter in scripture & tradition
- Traditionally connected author
- o In the Bible-
 - Son of a Mary, who hosted christians (Acts 12:12)
 - Cousin of Barnabas (Colossians 4:10)
 - Original companion of Paul & Barnabas (Acts 12:25, 13:5)
 - Leaves them midway (Acts 13:13)
 - Continues with Barnabas later (Acts 15:37)
 - Seemingly reconciles with Paul (2 Tim 4:11, Philemon v23-24)
 - "Son" of Peter (1 Peter 5:13)
 - Maybe, probably not, the boy in following in Gethsemane (Mark 14:51-52)
- Alexandria, Egypt bishop, D. 68 AD

Synoptic Gospels

- What we call Matthew, Mark, Luke
- o **NOT** the Gnostic gospels
- All events and teachings in Mark can be found in Matthew and Luke
- M & M Timing
- Luke-Acts Evidences

Dating

- Early
 - Pre 70 AD
 - 61% of modern scholars go Pre 70
 - Three Key Reasons
 - Tradition / Church Fathers
 - Luke-Acts Temple Argument
 - Peter & Paul died in the early-mid 60's

Late

- Post 70 AD
- Many believe 70-80 AD
- Three Key Reasons
 - Prophecy isn't real, temple had to be down
 - Church fathers were liars
 - Mark is just a second century forgery

Audience

- Explains Hebrew world in a unique way
- De-emphasis on past scripture
- Latinisms
- Broad in detail

Controversies

- O Which ending is correct?
 - There is good early manuscript evidence along with testimony of early church fathers that the long ending is credible.
- I heard there was a missing portion found in the 1950's by a scholar?
 - Morton Smith of Columbia claimed to have found a missing portion of Mark in 1958. The broad consensus among christian and secular scholars is that Smith created a fake.
- Can I handle snakes or drink poison (Mark 16:18)?
 - Please don't! (Matthew 4:7) (Acts 28:3-6)
- Acts of Barnabas?
 - Does not pop up til the mid 400's, obviously a gnostic gospel that tries to use Mark's importance.
